The contest will be held Sunday, Apr. 23, 12:30–2:30 p.m. on the Nick Pender Lumpin County Stage in Hancock Park.

Rules for Pie Baking Contest

General Rules
All pies will be combined into a single category, but judged according to the rules listed under the types of pies below.

(a) Fruit ples (single or double crust) must contain pieces of fruit, home canned or fresh, Judged on crust, taste, texture and overall appearance. Upper crust may be decurative.
(b) Custard and non-fruit pies, including; pumpkin, pecan, butternills and key lime.

Specific Rules

- All entries must have contestant's name and phone # on the bottom of the plate or pan, so that it is not visible to the public or judges.
- Entries must be accompanied with a recipe and a list of ingredients without the contestants name on it.
- All entries should be made from scratch. No purchased crusts, mixes, icings, or canned fillings are allowed.
- Pies should be in a disposable container with one slice pre-cut for the judges. Pies may be donated after the contest if the contestant so desires.
- 5. No refrigeration is provided. 6. No commercial bakeries or restaurants are allowed to enter.
- 7. Prizes will be awarded for First, Second and Third Place. 8. All entries should arrive between 12:30–1:15 p.m. Awards Ceremony at 2:15 p.m.

Alternately rowdy, sentimental, sacred, and irreverent, they show the blues and the gospel, saw the strings and crack the lokes. The setting of the Mountain Music & Medicine Show is the Dahlonega Public Square in the era between Gold Rush days of the early 1800s up to more modern times of the early 1800s. Doc Johnson's Traveling Miracle Medicine Show has come to town, and set up on

Dec Johnson's Traveling Miracle Medicine Show has come to town and set up on the Square in front of Nix's Store, the hub of local commerce and the social center of the area. Doe brings musical acts with him as well as his own brand of humor while he exhorts folks to buy his "Wizard Water" elixir to fix their aches and ills. Folks come from all around to see Doc Johnson and hear the music. His fast-paced style and rapport with the crowd keeps toes a tapping and things moving briskly along. The scene occasionally shifts to short theater stories where local people comment on the goings-on of the day. These stories mix local history, culture and humor in the unique Southern Appalachian style of the time period. This is all presented in a live old-time radio broadcast. Take a trip back in time with the Mountain Music & Medicine Show.
